Dear Representative Suozzi:

The American Geriatrics Society (AGS) greatly appreciates your leadership in addressing the cost challenges of long-term care, including the forthcoming introduction of the Well-Being Insurance for Seniors to be at Home (WISH) Act, a bill to create federal catastrophic long-term care insurance for older adults. The AGS is a not-for-profit organization comprised of nearly 6,000 geriatrics health professionals and basic and clinical researchers dedicated to improving the health, independence, and quality of life of all older Americans. As geriatrics healthcare professionals, our members help their patients and their patients' families navigate the long-term care system on a daily basis. There is no doubt a huge gap in care for most patients when it comes to the provision of and access to long-term care.

Ensuring older adults' access to a wide range of high-quality and affordable long-term care options, including those that enable them to "age in place" in their own homes and communities, must be a priority. Many older adults lack the financial resources to pay out-of-pocket for long-term care services for any extended period and Medicare covers very few such services (and provides no coverage for assisted living or non-skilled nursing home services). Medicaid remains the primary payer for both institutional and community-based long-term services and supports (LTSS), however in order to qualify for Medicaid many older Americans must "spend down" their assets. Family caregivers continue to provide the majority of long-term care for older Americans – often without sufficient training or support. It is critically important that we start to develop solutions to ensure robust choice in LTSS for older adults and alleviate burden on families.

Thank you for all you are doing to support and expand access to long-term care. The WISH Act highlights that we have under-resourced care for older adults and underinvested in the care we all need as we age. We appreciate your leadership on this important legislation and welcome the opportunity to work with you on this issue moving forward. We look forward to reviewing the legislation when it is introduced.
